What a thrill it is to have the opportunity of helping others experience growth, development and maturity in their lives! Still they lived in such poverty that they used brown paper bags as hats to protect the children from the sun as they worked. This couple did not have much to offer their children except their deep faith in God. They expected the Lord to bless their home and their children and He did.

These parents taught their children the value of gaining a good education. In fact their expectation was strong enough to influence fifteen out of the seventeen to seek college degrees. The children graduated from schools like Harvard, Yale, Vanderbilt, UCLA, Stanford, Brown, Syracuse, and the University of Arkansas. It wasn't always easy but they were raised with an expectation that would not allow them to accept failure or defeat.

When it came time to send the first child off to

college there wasn't enough tuition money even though the family had saved every penny possible. Several avenues of financing were explored but each seemed a dead end. Finally the entire family (12 at that time) was gathered into the kitchen and a prayer meeting was held. The father reminded the Lord of the way He had rescued Joseph from the pit. "Was that just a one time thing, Lord?" he asked.

The next day he set out in his old GMC pickup to call on a local landowner. He came back honking his horn. "That good man was just waiting for me," he said breathlessly, holding up a piece of paper. "I said I was going to send you children to college and could he help us get started and he asked me how much we needed and when I told him twelve hundred dollars he went inside and came back holding this check!"

What would happen in our churches if we stopped looking at our obstacles and failures and started anticipating the things our Father is expecting to do for us? What would happen if we stopped making excuses for our failures and got busy finding ways to turn them into successes? What would happen if we called some prayer meetings with our church families and sought the face of God until He



So, you have agreed to take on the Twos and Threes Class in Sunday School? Congratulations, you have accepted one of the most rewarding and exciting opportunities of your life! No, it isn't or shouldn't be just playtime for these active toddlers. You have an opportunity to build a strong spiritual foundation in these young lives. Spiritual foundation? In a two-year-old!? Am I kidding? Absolutely not. Twos and Threes (we call them Nursery Babies at our church) are so ready and eager to learn and experience everything. Let's give them the Lord.

It's a real challenge to plan a five-minute lesson that will impact a young child's life. The key, of course, is to have short, focused activities throughout your Sunday School hour that refer to the same repeated phrase or theme each week: "God made the world" or "Jesus is my good friend" or "God takes care of me." Activities of approximately five minutes each should include singing, prayer and offering, lesson or story time and a stretching time.

Do you have more in your Sunday School teacher's book to share than you actually get done? Why not extend your Sunday School hour into the worship service and offer a nutritious snack, short playtime (no more than 15 minutes), singing and stretch. Use the same story time from Sunday School (remember, repetition and routine are the key), add in a color and/or craft time and you've got it! You will be surprised at how grateful your parents are. It's very difficult to enjoy the adult service with a toddler crawling all over the pews, but many parents are reluctant to send them to a nursery to "just play". You can provide a valuable alternative!

Recruit some extra teachers for your worship hour. You can do on-the-job training by asking each one to help you out for a few weeks and then gradually wean yourself away from this part of the service.

The biggest challenge you may face in teaching Nursery Babies is how to get them to stay in your class without a parent and without crying. We use a four-week approach: The first Sunday, the child may just want to visit in the classroom for a short time (with one parent or grandparent). The second Sunday, encourage the child and parent to stay. The third Sunday, the child should be lovingly but firmly encouraged to sit in his own chair, with Mom or Dad close by. The fourth Sunday, meet the child and parent at the door and take the child to the table or learning area. The parent leaves. If you can distract the child and keep him busy, he will probably make it through

the entire classtime. It helps a lot if you have an assistant to hold the child on their lap, to provide "cuddles" and assurance so that you can concentrate on the class at large (non-related grandparents and senior citizens are especially good at this). If the child is screaming loud enough to wake Lazarus after five minutes, take him back to his parents and encourage them to start again the next week. After a few weeks, the child will be bouncing into the room by himself! Of course, we all know there are going to be exceptions!

As I said, you have accepted the most exciting challenge in the church! Remember to pray for your little ones each week, and pray for yourself as well, that God will use you in His plan to help build a strong foundation for your church's future!


