In our postmodern age truth is consistently and wrongly defined as a matter of one's personal preference or perspective. Relativism suggests that truth is determined for oneself and is therefore unique and different for each individual. This line of thought is drawing a very pronounced chasm between those who hold to a convictional belief of absolute truth and those who are champions of relativism.

A century ago the church had the public's trust and admiration. It was allowed to speak with an agreed upon authority. Even if it did not convert every unbeliever, the church exercised a formidable influence on morals with a clear delineation of right and wrong. Today the world has joined Pilate, maybe the first postmodernist, in asking: "Truth, what is truth?"

The postmodern world we are a part of is flooded with doubt and skepticism. People resist absolute claims from any source. In his book, Losing Our Virtue, David Wells writes, "This is the first time a civilization has existed that, to a significant extent, does

not believe in objective right and wrong."

Since the Fall of Adam and Eve mankind has struggled to grasp and maintain an accurate perception of reality. The guilt and condemnation experienced as a result of their disobedience caused Adam and Eve to try to hide from God. It is obvious that after the Fall their entire perception of reality had drastically changed. When Adam and Eve sinned, their minds were robbed of the true knowledge of God.

They had known God by being with Him. They understood truth by being in the presence of Truth Himself. When they sinned and were banished from the garden, Adam and Eve

lost their relationship with God and the knowledge of truth which was so intrinsic to that relationship.

The truth is that only when we see things in the light of God, do we see things accurately, as they actually are. It is only when we see things in the light of God that we see what is really important and what isn't. Ambition, pres-

They want a spiritual encounter that is so transcendent, so real, so genuine, so life changing and heart satisfying that it leaves them with a deep, settled peace that they have in fact finally experienced the Truth firsthand.

The church today is surrounded with people who want to experience God, who want to believe deeply, freshly, and personally the Truth. This is a world longing for the Word to be made flesh. The world is asking the church for living proof that the message we preach and teach is real. They want to know where is the love of God we talk about? The changed lives? The selfless giving? The heart of the matter for a disciple or learner of Christ is that we can be a life-long learner through our successes and our failures.



David C. McCasland

tells about the Senior Professional Golfers Association being the "second chance tour". Sportswriter Jack Cavanaugh says, "In no other sport does and athlete who never made it to world-class status in his prime get a second chance in middle age to prove himself and amass riches that he could only dream of in his 20's, 30's or 40's." (Our Daily Bread, Mar., Apr., May 2001).

The prepositional question is, "Are you looking for the truth of a second chance"? Coming on the heels of this question is a reactive myth that if you once miss "God's Best" or fail for the Lord in some way, you can never render gold medal service to God. What a trap of despair to believe there is no healing, reclaimation, reconciliation or learning for us after we have failed or felt to let down after some great success. We would do well to consult I Kings 19:1-8 to see how Elijah worked through his despair after great success.

Hebrews 11 gives us a second chance Hall of Fame of individuals who failed or overcame great obstacles to come back strong for God. These champions of faith exhibited God's grace and the epitome of "Principled Love and Truth."

In <u>Theology and Experience:</u> A <u>Reappraisal of John Wesley's Theology</u>, William James Stuart notes "there appears to be three coinciding and well marked periods in the religious development of Wesley. These three "States" look like this:

The Natural Man "The natural man has neither faith- Birth to 1725 nor love; one that is awakened, fear with love."

The Legal Man- "...a babe in Christ, love and fear- 1725 to 1738, Age 22.

The Evangelical "...a father in Christ, love Man without fear." 1738 on, age 34 yrs. and 11 mths.

The categories natural, legal and evangelical man form the main themes in Wesley's 1739 sermon, "On the Spirit of Bondage and Adoption." The descriptions of the categories are from his comments on I John 4:18 in his Explanatory Notes on the New Testament, published in 1754. In those comments, Wesley uses the language of Johannes A. Bengel, "No faith, fear, fear and faith, and love without fear." But the progressive steps from natural to awakened, then babe, then father, appear to be Wesley's own language.

The implication of these truths is that God the Holy Spirit works with us and in us in progressive and continuous way saving, sanctifying and continually developing us for His glory and honor.

Have you experienced a failure or a success lately? Please know that the grace of Jesus Christ is working in you to perfect a life-long learning experience.

The Power of Truth in an Unbelieving Age



Christian parents, teachers, and preachers know that it is tough to teach truth in a world that no longer grasps such a concept. For increasing numbers of people truth determined by one one's individual background, life experiences, personality, and opinion. In other words, truth has become a very subjective thing. We often

hear preachers and theologians lamenting that truth is no longer objective (based on something or someone outside us) and absolute (true for everyone, everywhere, and every time). Each person decides for themselves what is true. Truths are chosen from a smorgasbord of ideas like favorite snacks at a party, all on the basis of personal taste. This is indeed a frustrating and even frightening matter for us.

Perhaps all is not lost nor is it hopeless for the Christian. Remember that both the Old Testament (OT) and the New Testament (NT) reflect that God's people have long been surrounded by pluralism and uncertainty, yet have tenaciously maintained their declarations (of, Thus saith the Lord. . .) and their families (of, I believe in). We still have a firm grip on truths based on what the Bible says. The same Holy Spirit who inspired the Scriptures has preserved them and providentially overseen the passing on of their claims. We are now a part of that task, to pass them on to the next generation with clarity and confidence. Here are a couple of suggestions as we fill this critical role.

1. Truth comes as (and is centered in) a Person. The OT reveals truth about God and His work in this world. He is different than those gods worshipped by Israel's neighbors. He is unique because He is true. In the OT the statement, "God is true" refers to his reliability and trustworthiness. He can be counted on. It is not too difficult to see how we move from the idea that the Person is true to the idea that what He says is true. The truthfulness of a statement is first based on the character of the One who said it. Since He is trustworthy then His word is true. In fact, the Bible says, "Let God be true and every man a liar." Obviously He alone determines what is true and what is not true.

As the biblical story unfolds we find that ultimately Jesus, the Son of God is the climax of truth. In Him alone there is truth enough to redeem the whole world for His is "the way, the truth, and the life" indeed! Yes, truth centers in Him for all other biblical truth that precedes or follows His earthly coming, explains it's meaning and expounds it's significance for us.

2. With this in mind, learn to appreciate the surprising unity of the Bible's message. Often this is missed because of the large volume of Scripture and the lengthy period of time covered within it but these features should actually confirm it are maintained throughout and are a part of the grand finale of God's purposes. Also, at the climax of the unfolding drama of the Bible is the record of the death of Christ on a cross, and both the Gospel writers and Epistle writers claim that this death of Christ is for our sins. This event is followed three days later with the declaration that Jesus rose bodily from the grave. (Let me remind you that the Scriptures clearly suggest that these claims of creation, crucifixion for sins, and bodily resurrection are true and are to be believed! It sort-of gives you an idea of what it means to be a believer-

one who embraces God's truth-claims). I know that many people say it isn't true. It can't be true. It doesn't make sense. I have come to the conclusion that apart from the Bible's truth (especially the core Christ's crucifixion and resurrection




for our salvation) nothing else makes sense! Not our origin nor our destiny and not anything in between the joy and sadness, the laughter and tears, the hope and the disappointment, the accomplishments and the failures, it all makes no sense without the part that really matters.

If the Bible were not true, then we would be victims of the uncertainty and confusion of the world around us. But we have truth, truth to hear, believe, apply and share. Truth that exists not only as facts and information but as a living and personal Christ. What a privilege to know and to share it in some fashion! Doesn't it make sense that in a world like ours a clear and confident voice of truth will come like refreshing water to weary hearts and minds? To those who teach our children (both young and old) you have some solid convictions about he basic truth-claims of Scripture. You are critical to the advance of the rule of God in the individual lives of people of all ages.

ON THE CUTTING EDGE

"For the word is living and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart" (Hebrews 4:12).



I got a paper cut the other day. Nothing particularly unusual-except ironically I cut my hand while opening a box of bandages! Things turned out pretty well, actually. The remedy was at hand as soon as the hurt occurred. Did you ever open the Bible expecting to find a bandage, and instead you discovered its cutting edge? You came expecting comfort, and you found conviction? You came seeking a soothing salve, and instead found a sword? The Bible isn't a tame, passive book full of benign, fine-sounding platitudes. It's sharp, alive, edgy. It pokes, prods, and penetrates. And like a surgeon's scalpel, it hurts in order to heal.

That's why it sounds a bit strange when Christians talk about "doing devotions"- as if Bible study could be reduced to a safe, controlled formula. I have never found any Bible verses that tell us to "do devotions." Now, don't misunderstand. The Bibles does urge us to fill our minds with God's Word and to pray without ceasing. Countless believers find great value in systematic daily Bible reading and prayer. We need the discipline. Daily devotions nourish us with vital spiritual food. But my point is simply this: while its good to "have devotions, it's even better to "be devoted."

Late in King David's life, he called together the leaders of Israel and exhorted them to be faithful to God. He said, "Now devote your heart and soul to seeking the Lord your God" (1 Chronicles 22:19). Then he turned to his son Solomon, the heir-apparent to the throne, and urged "A the God of your father, and serve him with wholehearted devotion and with a willing mind" (1 Chronicles 28:9).

Members of the early church "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer" Acts 2:42). Paul wrote, "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love" (Romans 12:10). He urged Timothy, "Devote yourself to the public reading of Scripture, to preaching and to teaching" (1 Timothy 4:13), and he told Titus, "Our people must learn to devote themselves to going what is good" (Titus 3:14).

How devoted are we? Walk into any Christian bookstore

and you can find a wide variety of Bibles for sale, so many that it's hard to decide which one to buy. (When is the last time you thanked God for the availability of his Word in your own language?) Yet with all our Bibles, America continues to stumble down a dangerous path toward biblical illiteracy. It isn't enough just to own a Bible, even a thick one with lots of study helps. We need to read, absorb, and live it, letting the Word do its spiritual surgery in us.

Could there even be a certain danger in the proliferation of study bibles? Why reflect on how a passage of Scripture applies to your life if someone else-a scholar, no less-has already one it for you? And does the niche-marketing of devotional Bibles tend to tailor the Bible to fit us, instead of compelling us to tailor ourselves to the Bible.

Devotion to God isn't just something we do 15 minutes a day. It should describe who we are. Because the best Bible translation is the one that translates it into action.

Under his mother's guidance, Harry Ironside began to memorize Scripture when he was three. By age fourteen, he had read the Bible fourteen times, "once for each year." During the rest of his life he read the Bible through at least once a year. A pastor recalled a Bible conference at which he and Ironside were two of the speakers. During the conference the speakers discussed their approaches to personal devotions. Each man shared what he had heard from the Word that morning. When it was Ironside's turn, he hesitated, then said, "I read the book of Isaiah." He was saturated with the Word of God.
